As of this writing the Snake River Basin is tenuously perched at 97% of our annual snow water equivalent and at 88% of average snow pack. The Upper Snake River Basin Reservoir storage is at 78%. American Falls reservoir is taking on 2982 cfs and releasing 2740; a difference of 242 cfs or a plus 480 acre feet per day. It all looks good! Right? The ducks and geese are back and the crocus and day lilies are growing in my yard as buds are breaking on my rose and currant bushes. It's February 28th. It feels like we are a month early for just about everything. Experience and memory tells me that the good weather won't last and more winter will come; but according to the Weather Channel, March is coming in like a lamb. I am hopeful that the lion will precede April showersalthough I fear we are in for a long, early summer. Que sera sera. Were it so easy for most of us, but sadly no. Although as a City we will make hay while the sun shines.

The golf course is open! The new fleet of carts is here and needs to be used. Inventory is beginning to fill the racks, with much more on the way. Denny tells me he already has 17 tournaments scheduled, and he expects to end up with 20~25. The high school golf team started their season today and season passes are selling. Denny also tells me there is a group from a bit farther east that plans to play every Sunday on our course. From my perspective, it is exciting! Hell, I haven't hit a golf ball in over 20 years, but I am considering it. Of course if I do, it won't be golf per se but more hack and hoe.

Which is exactly what the Street Department is doing at Willow Bay as they remove encroaching willows to make room for the new boat docks being installed later this month. The Street Department has also been busy sweeping streets, trimming trees and prepping the few gravel roads in town for grading. Speaking of Golf and Willow Bay I will be meeting with the folks from the Bureau of Reclamation to discuss the installation of a driving range near the old VFW trap range this week. And yes Dave and Bob, I am still looking for a spot that will accommodate a new trap range. Like Dad used to say, "He sure ain't fast, but he's really slow."Don't be discouragedthough, I do finish.

Progress was made during the Ferry Hollow Trail open house this past Thursday; thanks to all of you who attended. I had several very good conversations with many of you and look forward to more as progress is made.
