And, lastly congratulations to Skylyn Sprague who was selected by the retiring East Magic District Officers as the 2015-16 District President from a pool of 13 applicants from the seven different schools in the District.

Wednesday evening found me at the City Council meeting. I am sure Preston Crompton will do a very good job of covering it for the Power County Press, as he was there. I would just like to put in a plug for the Fifth Annual American Classic bow fishing tournament that the Council approved for May 16 and 17. Towards the end of the Council meeting the FFA Ag Issues team presented the public forum on the current Idaho Ag Gag law. Thanks Dan Hammond and Kurtis Workman for your excellent questions and critiques. The kids did a great job representing both sides of the issue. They are a ways away from being ready for the State event next month. But then they are just like the rest of the 31 one kids that competed earlier in the day as they are learning to put their differences and egos aside (they are as vast and stark as I have ever seen in a group of high school kids) while working towards the good of the whole. Why do some of us lose that characteristic, forget what it means to put your best effort forward and remain receptive to the thoughts and desires of others. I remain humbled by their ability to do so. Kids, at least mine, are excellent teachers.

I know Senator Guthrie has; which may be why he remains an advocate not only for education in general but also for Agricultural Education and the FFA.
